Kia ora,

Despite the weather we managed to complete the Road Race last Thursday. Our children ran magnificently and 27 qualified to represent the Rural Schools at the Bush Road Race in Eketahuna tomorrow. Good luck to all of you.

We are busy practising with Whaea Georgia for the Cultural Festival on June 29th. The children are doing a great job learning both words and actions. Alfredton and Kumeroa are the host schools this year. Please see the note below about help we have been asked to provide for the event.

Next Tuesday at 3pm we will be having our next hui for our Maori whanau. It was wonderful to meet with those who could attend our meeting last term. Hopefully more will come to our next meeting. We will be discussing your aspirations for your tamariki and how we can support them to achieve their best.

As part of our work to improve our understanding of how we can meet the aspirations of all families, staff will be attending a workshop on August 16th in Palmerston North. This will be led by Dr Melanie Riwai-Couch who has written a very readable book 'Niho Taniwhai' which explores culturally responsive practices for educators. This will support us to implement national actions and expectations, and will improve teaching and learning for all our students. This will be a day when the children will be learning at home.

Over the past two terms staff have been working closely with Karen Lethbridge from Evaluation Associates to develop their understanding of student agency and also exploring ways to improve our teaching of reading. This work also completes our PaCT (Progress and Consistency Tool) training. For mid-year reports we will be using PaCT to give you a clear idea of how your child is progressing in maths, writing and reading. Booking forms for our Parent Conversations will be out today. Please make an appointment so that you can discuss your child's progress with their class teacher.

At the end of term we will be ending our SeeSaw subscription and moving to Spotlight, which is part of eTap our school management system. Unfortunately, SeeSaw have increased their subscription prices, which now makes them unaffordable for small schools. Although they have improved what they offer, as an American company, the changes are of no benefit to us. A yearly subscription increase of \$2800 to pay for these improvements is not a good use of our money. Spotlight is free and offers most of the things that SeeSaw does. It also allows parents to inform us of absences, fill in permission slips and make bookings for parent meetings too. I will send home information on how to load the Spotlight app shortly. Staff are currently loading children onto it and exploring how to use it. Next term we will hold a meeting for whanau about using Spotlight.


#### Cultural Festival


