Kia ora,

Last week we held auditions for our school production. Parts will be announced this week. All of the children are busy learning the songs which have very catchy tunes.

Our theme for this term is based around our production "Pirates v Mermaids'. Huia class is learning about seafarers from around the world including pirates! They are improving their research skills and will be choosing how to present what they discover e.g. imovie, slide show, poster or even writing their own play script. Tui class is also learning about pirates and merpeople.

For the first part of the term all of the children are focusing on speeches. Our inter-school speech competition will take place on 29th August. Either a Year 6 or 8 child will be chosen to represent Alfredton at the Pahiatua Lions' Speech Competition on 6th September. The children are also attending mini workshops to improve their writing skills.

Our House of Science Boxes this term are: Simple Machines (tools that make work easier), Hot Stuff (heat and solar energy) and Fireworks.

In maths Huia class is currently improving their knowledge and strategies working with fractions as well as calculating perimeter and area. Tui class is working on shape space and measures.

With Whaea Georgia we are learning a new waiata, how to play a Maori game and the girls have begun learning to use poi. We are also looking at Marae protocol before our visit on September 19th.

Mr Gardner and myself have been working with a group of teachers learning about the financial literacy program Banqer. We have begun work with Huia class this week learning about basic income. The children will be bringing login details home with them shortly so that you can see what they are learning. They may also bring some homework to discuss with you. If you have any questions, please contact me and I will be happy to answer them.

#### Update - Child & Adolescent Oral Health Service

This letter is to aid expectations and answer concerns raised by some whānau/families. Please feel free to share.

News and radio articles report delays in health services due to workforce vacancies, sickness and the impact of COVID-19. These issues have impacted almost all health services and providers, including the Child and Adolescent Oral Health Service.

The Child and Adolescent Oral Health Service is currently operating at reduced capacity. Many tamariki are waiting up to two years between examinations. We recognise that this is not ideal, however with regular brushing and a healthy diet the risks of tooth decay are vastly reduced. The plan is return to providing a normal service as and when circumstances allow.

Also, if an appointment is made and can no longer be kept, please let the service know to reschedule so the time can be used for another child.

### TARARUA SCHOOL SPEED PROPOSALS




Local Road Speed Management Planning

We are writing to inform you about the proposed changes to speed limits around schools in our district, as part of the Government's national road safety plan.

Tararua District Council has developed a comprehensive proposal to address the required changes within our district and your address has been identified as one that will be directly impacted by these proposed speed limit adjustments.

### Alfredton School



A Variable Speed Limit (VSL) of 30km/h is being proposed for the school entrances where there will be a significant concentration of pedestrians during pick up and drop off times. On the map, this is indicated by an orange dotted line. This reduced speed limit of 30km/h will be enforced during school pick up and drop off times to ensure the safety of everyone in the area.

Additionally, a 60km/h buffer zone is being proposed on all approaches leading to the school. The purpose of this buffer zone is to encourage a safe and appropriate reduction in vehicle speed ahead of the school zone. The extension of the 60km/h zone will stretch to the beginning of the urban area and include St, Aldan's Church within its boundaries. It's essential to note that the 60km/h buffer zone will be in effect at all times, as depicted by the blue markings on the map.


