

Visit to the Pahiatua Marae - 19th September









My favourite part of the Marae visit was when we played a game where there are a few people and when the guy said a word that meant you had to go left or right and you had to try to catch the stick next to you without dropping it. **Quinn**

On the 19th of September 2023 we went to the marae in Pahiatua. We all went there to learn about our culture. Probably my most favourite thing was making the poi. We had to get some already knitted poi handles then we had to make a little loop in the string then add some fluff. You had to get two other strings to tie it around the fluff to secure it, then we got fabric to wrap it around the fluff. In my opinion it was a really fun experience and I enjoyed it alot. Before the poi making we learnt about our pepeha. Whaea Hiria would come and teach us the words for it. It took quite a long time but it was worth it. We had to say the words in front of everybody. **Kitana**

On Tuesday Alfredton School went and visited the Marae in Pahiatua for the day. We did lots of activities but my favourite thing was making the poi. I sat down and was given 2 strings that we plaited with 2 colours. My colours were light blue and yellow. We were also given 2 pieces of fabric for both poi and stuffing to go on the inside.

First we grabbed our string and there was a little loop at the end of it where we had to put the stuffing and then once we put the stuffing in we knotted these 2 other ropes around the stuffing to keep it in place. Once we had done that we would grab our fabric and pull it really tight making a nice circle and making sure there was no stuffing hanging out anywhere. Once we did that we twisted it around and then got a parent to help us tie the rope around really tight so it would stay all in place.

Next we cut the leftover rope and then we put tape around the rope to cover it. We then looped the tape around the rope about 3 times and then we were done. Next we did the exact same thing but on the other poi. I really enjoyed it and I found it easy to make once I got used to it. Last of all we had to name our poi and I named mine Bobby. **Farryn**

My favourite part at the marae was the songs that the college kids sang. It was so cool all of the songs were so familiar. **Jordan**

On Tuesday the 19th of September, the whole school went to the Pahiatua Marae. There, we learned about Maori culture and history, as well as the stories behind the many carvings on the walls of the Marae and traditional greetings. While there was much to be learned there, I specifically remember the intricate carvings of various important figures in Maori history. The carving featured traditional Maori patterns and had a story to go with it. We were told, "stories here are told not in books, but on the walls."

I really enjoyed one game we played. We had special sticks called Rakau, and we had to stand in a circle and hold it straight in front of us. We were then told a Maori direction, either right or left, and we then had to move that way while letting go of our Rakau. we would then attempt to catch the Rakau next to us. The hard part was moving the correct direction in time and simultaneously catching the falling Rakau next to us. Getting a turn where nobody dropped a Rakau was rare, but always satisfying when we did. **Zephyr**

At the marae I liked to learn about the Rakau/Flax stick. We learnt how to use light feet in battle and to dodge the opponents moves. **Otto**

You will be able to order high quality prints, canvases and framed prints, and digital files directly from the viewing gallery. The ordering process is simple and secure. The gallery will be live for 14 days. All orders must be placed in that 14-day period. Prices start at \$8.00 for individual items, and include the opportunity to purchase packages, or individual products. Once orders have been placed, your photos and / or canvas / framed prints will be delivered to school within four weeks.
